

PUBLIC NOTICE

Pursuant to the Wyoming Administrative Procedure Act and the Wyoming Public Service Commission's (Commission) Rules, notice is hereby given of the Application of Cheyenne Light, Fuel and Power Company d/b/a Black Hills Energy (CLFP or the Company) for authority to implement a Blockchain Interruptible Service tariff, as more fully described below.

CLFP, a subsidiary of Black Hills Corporation, is engaged in generation, transmission and distribution of electricity. CLFP is a public utility as defined in Wyo. Stat. § 37-1-101(a)(vi)(C), subject to the Commission's jurisdiction pursuant to Wyo. Stat. § 37-2-112.

CLFP filed its Application with the Commission on September 28, 2018, requesting authority to implement a Blockchain Interruptible Service tariff. CLFP states that its existing tariffs are not sufficient to attract blockchain business and continue to provide safe and reliable service without adversely impacting existing retail customers. CLFP designed this tariff to serve blockchain customers while ensuring that current retail customers continue to receive safe, reliable and affordable service. Blockchain customers, according to the Company, are unique because they are large consumers of electricity and may represent loads for only a limited amount of time.

The proposed tariff is designed to serve customers seeking loads of 10,000 kW or greater who are able to have power interrupted at the discretion of the Company. Such customers must enter into a Blockchain Interruptible Service Agreement with CLFP. CLFP states the tariff assigns all risk to the Company. CLFP is responsible for all blockchain customer's power supply costs and revenues, all third-party transmission charges attributable to blockchain customers and all overhead expenses allocated to such customers. CLFP will provide two credits to its retail customers through the Power Cost Adjustment (PCA) commodity balancing account.

This is not a complete description of the Application. The Application is on file with the Commission at its offices in Cheyenne, Wyoming, and may be inspected there by any interested person during regular business hours. Anyone desiring to intervene and become a party to this proceeding or to file a statement, comment, protest, or request a hearing in this matter, must file the same with the Commission in writing on or before November 5, 2018. Any petitions for intervention or hearing shall set forth the grounds of the proposed intervention or request for hearing and the position and interest of the petitioner.
